A. CALL TO ORDER

The regular meeting of the Lake and Peninsula Borough Assembly was called to order by Mayor Glen R. Alsworth, Sr. on Tuesday, May 15, 2012 at 10:12 a.m. in the Rainbow Hall, Levelock Alaska. The meeting was not transmitted via telephone.

B. ROLL CALL

A quorum was established with Mayor Glen R. Alsworth, Sr. and Assembly members Randy Alvarez, Sue Anelon, Michelle Ravenmoon and Victor Seybert present. Assembly members Nana Kalmakoff and Myra Olsen were absent, excused.

C. APPROVAL OF AGENDA –

A motion was made by Assembly member Randy Alvarez and seconded by Assembly member Sue Anelon to approve the agenda for the May 15, 2012 regular meeting as presented. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

D. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion was made by Assembly member Michelle Ravenmoon to approve the minutes of April 16, 2012. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Randy Alvarez. The Mayor gave the clerk a set of corrected minutes. Assembly member Ravenmoon noted that there are two “t”s in the last name Sackett. No other errors were noted. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

E. CONSENT AGENDA - none

F. MANAGER'S & STAFF REPORTS

1. **Introduction of Guests** – The Mayor invited each person to sign the sign in sheet. Each person then introduced themselves.
2. **Manager's Report** – Lamar Cotten explained that the Governor had approved the budget and vetoed some capital projects, but none of the Lake and Peninsula Borough capital projects were eliminated. Levelock received money for new energy efficient street lights and an AMPY meter system. One of the other projects approved in Lake and Peninsula Borough was a hydro-electric project for Chignik Lagoon.
3. **Consultant's Report** – Mr. Cotten explained that Mr. Bob Loeffler did not write a report this month because he coordinated the trip to Red Dog mine. The Assembly was able to talk to a lot of people about the mine and the impacts to them and the community. Mr. Cotten explained that a Payment In Lieu of development fee pays to educate the Assembly in addition to paying for a consultant and to defend the Borough against mining related law suits. Several Assembly members agreed that the trip to Red Dog as a good one. **Howard Nelson**, Levelock, asked what other mining is going on in the Borough. Mr. Cotten answered that Rio Tinto is doing some exploratory work in the Nondalton area, but otherwise he was unaware of other work. Mr. Nelson said that he knew there was some work being done at Fox Lake behind Big Mountain. Assembly member Alvarez said that there is a company that will be staging in Igiugig to do some mining work near Levelock, but the work is not within Lake and Peninsula Borough. Mr. Keeler verified that there is some mining activity just outside the Borough in several areas. The Mayor thanked Mr. Nelson for letting the Assembly and staff know about the possible mining activity and said if the miners are operating without a permit, the Borough will resolve the problem.
4. **Community Development Coordinator's Report** – Mr. Keeler said that the comprehensive plan meetings have been ongoing and that the schedule has been hectic due to the snowy weather and office closure. Today will begin a trip of eight villages. Mr. Keeler noted that the scrap haul out project is getting closer to realization.
5. **Planning Commission Minutes** – No discussion.
6. **Fishery Report**– Mr. Cotten reminded all that the Board of Fish meeting will be in Naknek in December. Chuck McCallum has been working with the Port Heiden fishermen. There was a discussion of the options to create a special fishing district in Levelock. **Howard Nelson** said he submitted two proposals to the Board of Fish in

February. He said he wants to submit an emergency order to get more fish for the village because they now have their own processing plant. Assembly member Alvarez said that Levelock needs to send a lot of people to the Board of Fish meetings. The more people requesting the same policy change, the more the board is swayed to pass the proposal. The Mayor added that the Borough has helped people to attend the meetings in the past, and would do this again. Assembly member Alvarez suggested Levelock fishermen meet with Fish and Game and Mr. McCallum to develop a management plan. Mr. Cotten said he will have Mr. McCallum call Howard Nelson. **S. Apokedok** said he is concerned about King Salmon and the commercial fishing on the Branch River. He said the reds run at the same time as the Kings and the Kings are a by-catch.

7. **Finance Report** – Mr. Cotten told the Assembly that the Borough received \$200,000 in the last months from the Tanner Crab fishery.
8. **Lobbyist's Report** – Mr. Cotten noted that 79 bills were introduced into the legislature this year. Mr. Hickey's report gave a summary of capital project in the Borough.
9. **Clerk's Report** – Ms. Conley presented a written report and did not add any additional comments.
10. **School Superintendent's Report** – The Mayor noted that graduations were taking place recently.

G. PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. **Ordinance 12-03 re: Amending LPB Code Chapter 6.73 – Hearing & Decision** – Motion to open the Public Hearing for Ordinance 12-03 was made by Assembly member Alvarez and seconded by Assembly member Seybert. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The Public Hearing was open at 10:47 am. The Mayor read the ordinance by name. He summarized by explaining that the ordinance will allow the Borough Permanent Fund to be separated from the General Fund, as it had been for years, but due to changes to the General Accounting Standards Board (GASB) the two were combined this last year. The ordinance does not change the actual percentage of fish tax that is deposited into the Permanent Fund, but it just directs the staff to take the 20% from each check, rather than to accumulate the checks into the General Fund and then transfer the 20% to the Permanent Fund from the General Fund. The Clerk reported that Ordinance 12-03 had been properly noticed and no comments were received either written or verbal. The Mayor called for questions. Assembly member Alvarez noted that if Levelock gets an exclusive fishing district, more fish tax would come to the Borough. The Mayor agreed and said that is a good reason for the Borough to fight for this policy change. Assembly member Ravenmoon asked why the Ordinance reads "may" and not "shall." Mr. Cotten said he did not know why that was changed, but he recommends the "shall" be kept and not changed to "may." The Mayor called for any further comments. There were none. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to close the Public Hearing for Ordinance 12-03. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The Public Hearing was closed at 10:53 am. Motion was made by Assembly member Ravenmoon to adopt Ordinance 12-03 with the change to the proposed ordinance to retain the "shall." Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. The Mayor called for ex parte or conflict of interest. The Mayor noted that anyone in the room could, someday, benefit from the Permanent Fund. He explained that the code establishes a dividend to the residents when the Permanent Fund balance is \$20 million. The Mayor called for discussion. Assembly member Alvarez said he likes the School Endowment fund and hopes someday that the fund will be large enough that the Borough can make the

annual payment to the school from the interest on the principal. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

2. **Ordinance 12-04 re: Amending the 11-12 (FY 12) Budget - Hearing & Decision -** Motion to open the public hearing for Ordinance 12-04 was made by Assembly member Alvarez. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Ravenmoon. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was open at 10:58 am. The Mayor read the ordinance by name. The Clerk reported that Ordinance 12-04 had been properly noticed and no comments were received either written or verbal. Mr. Cotten explained that each year the staff presents a budget that is the best estimate they can make; however, each year the actual amount is different and so a budget amendment is necessary. This year four line items required amending: Public Employees Retirement System (PERS), legal expenses, comprehensive plan expenses, the wind feasibility study in Igiugig. The total changes increased the budget by \$178,675.00. The Mayor called for any comments. There were none. Motion was made by Assembly member Anelon to close the public hearing on ordinance 12-04. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Alvarez. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was closed at 11:01 am. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to approve Ordinance 12-04. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Ravenmoon. The Mayor called for ex parte or conflict of interest. The Mayor declared that he has two businesses that could benefit from the Borough budget; however, all travel is bid and the Borough may choose any travel or lodging facility. The Clerk asked if anyone present wanted to challenge the Mayor's right to vote on Ordinance 12-04. No challenges were declared. The Mayor called for comments or discussion. There was none. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.
3. **Ordinance 12-05 re: Adopting the 12-13 (FY 13) Budget - Hearing & Decision** Motion was made to open the public hearing for Ordinance 12-05 by Assembly member Seybert and seconded by Assembly member Alvarez. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was opened at 11:04 am. The Mayor read the ordinance by name. The Clerk reported that Ordinance 12-05 had been properly noticed and no comments were received either written or verbal. The Mayor summarized the ordinance by explaining that this budget is for the next fiscal year which will begin July 1, 2012. The Mayor called for comments or questions. Assembly member Ravenmoon noted that page 116 includes the Borough goals and objectives. She added that the Borough now produces a newsletter. She urged those who do not receive the newsletter and would like to should contact Kate Conley. The Mayor explained that the budget is a best guess and will need to be amended each year to reflect the actual amount, as was done with Ordinance 12-04. **Howard Nelson**, Levelock, asked if BBNC had been in touch with the Borough on their plan to spend \$35 million on economic development. Mr. Cotten said that yes, he is in contact with BBNC. They are looking for partners and their operational goal is not to be a grant agency, but partners and to receive a portion of the proceeds. He said the Borough is more than happy to work with BBNC. BBNC is looking for a 16% return, but they are willing to consider a lesser profit on their investment if the project benefits a community. Assembly member Alvarez added that there are 29 villages and 17 of those villages are in Lake and Peninsula Borough. There are twelve seats on the BBNC board and not one seat is held by a resident of Lake and Peninsula Borough. **Mr. Nelson** recommended the Borough pass a resolution to break BBNC into subgroups. The Mayor called for more comments. There were none. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to close the public hearing on Ordinance 12-05. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Ravenmoon. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was closed at 11:13 am. Motion was made by Assembly member Ravenmoon to adopt Ordinance 12-05. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Alvarez. The Mayor called for conflict of interest or ex parte. The Mayor declared that he has two companies which have the potential to be contracted on behalf of the Borough if one of his companies wins the bid. The Borough is not obligated to spend their money with any one company. By bidding low it saves the

Borough money. The clerk asked if any one present would like to challenge the Mayor's right to vote on Ordinance 12-05. No challenges were declared. The Mayor called for discussion. There was none. The Mayor called for questions. There were none. The motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

4. Ordinance 12-06 re: 5 year Lease for Recreational Cabin – Hearing & Decision

Motion was made to open the public hearing for Ordinance 12-06 by Assembly member Anelon. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Alvarez. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was opened at 11:16 am. The Mayor read the ordinance by name. The Clerk reported that Ordinance 12-06 had been properly noticed and no comments were received either written or verbal. Mr. Keeler explained that when the Borough was established, the State granted the Borough 125,000 acres of land from State holdings. Some of the land the Borough selected already had leases and/or building on the property. This parcel was selected from the State and had a cabin on the land. The man who currently holds the lease wishes to transfer the lease to three individuals. Each lease has rules regarding stewardship. This property is used only for recreation and so the lease is less expensive than a commercial property. The Borough currently generates approximately \$30,000 per year from land leases. The Mayor added that Borough policy is, generally, to not sell property, but to lease it to keep the opportunity to continue generating money from the land. The Assembly works hard to maximize the assets of the Borough to the benefit of the citizens. The Mayor called for comments or discussion. There was none. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to close the public hearing. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The public hearing was closed at 11:21 am. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to adopt Ordinance 12-06. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. The Mayor called for conflict of interest or ex parte. There was none declared. The Mayor called for discussion. There was none. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

H. NEW BUSINESS

1. **Ordinance 12-07 re: Amending LPB Code Chapter 4.15 – Introduction** - Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to introduce Ordinance 12-07 and set a public hearing for June 12, 2012. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Ravenmoon. The Mayor read the ordinance by title and noted a typographical error. The Mayor called for discussion. There was none. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote. The Mayor instructed the clerk to notice the ordinance and set a public hearing and meeting for June 12th.
2. **Resolution 12-03 A Resolution Approving Certain Unincorporated Communities and their Respective Native Village Council and/or Incorporated Nonprofit Entity for Participation in the FY 13 Community Revenue Sharing Program** - Motion was made by Assembly member Anelon to adopt Resolution 12-03. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Ravenmoon. The Mayor called for conflict of interest or ex parte. He noted that each member of the Assembly lives in one of the villages listed on the resolution, but none will benefit directly. No challenges were made. The Mayor called for discussion. Mr. Cotten explained that each year the Borough passes a similar resolution which allows the State to pay the funds for the communities to the Borough, who passes the money on directly to the villages. There was no further discussion. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.
3. **Resolution 12-04 A Resolution Accepting and Approving the Annual Operating Budget of the Lake and Peninsula School District for the Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2012 and ending June 30, 2013 (FY 13), and Projecting the Amount of Money to be made Available from Borough Revenues for School Purposes during that Fiscal Year** Motion was made by Assembly member Ravenmoon to adopt Resolution 12-05. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. The Mayor read the resolution by title. He then explained that by law the Borough is only obligated to give \$440,000 but actually gives \$1.17 million. The Borough was formed to protect the

schools. The philosophy of the Borough has always been to promote education. By giving more money the Borough forces the State to also give more. The Mayor then called for conflict of interest. Mayor Alsworth disclosed that he owns two businesses that may bid on requests for proposals from the school district. No challenges were made to the Mayor's right to bid on Resolution 12-04. Motion passed unanimously by voice vote.

4. **Resolution 12-05 A Resolution Expressing Appreciation to Dick Sharpe for His Exceptional Work and Important Contributions to the Chignik Boat Harbor Project** – Mr. Cotten said this resolution will be on the agenda in the Fall. Motion was made by Assembly member Alvarez to table Resolutions 12-05, 12-06, 12-07 and 12-08. Motion was seconded by Assembly member Anelon. Resolutions 12-05, 12-06, 12-07 and 12-08 will be tabled until the next regularly scheduled Assembly meeting in August 2012.
5. **Resolution 12-06 A Resolution Expressing Appreciation to the City of Chignik for their Dedication, Commitment and Efforts to the Chignik Boat Harbor Project**
6. **Resolution 12-07 A Resolution Expressing Appreciation to Walt Wrede for his Contributions to the Chignik Boat Harbor Project.**
7. **Resolution 12-08 A Resolution Expressing Appreciation to Jeff Currier for his Contributions to the Chignik Boat Harbor Project.**

I. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

1. **Borough Capital Project Updates** – The Mayor noted that the comprehensive plan is being rewritten and the staff is visiting every community to get their perspective on current and needed infrastructure and the community's hopes and dreams. One big concern is the lack of children to keep schools open. Another concern is the lack of jobs. Energy costs are another big concern. The completed comprehensive plan will have three parts: 1. A village plan; 2. A regional plan; 3. A borough-wide plan. Assembly member Alvarez said the Borough is concerned. No village can afford for their school to be closed. This can cause the villages to lose their PCE and then their clinic and then their runway. Utility costs are going up and it is getting harder and harder for villages to survive. Rural communities are at a turning point. It used to be inexpensive to live in the villages but now it is expensive and difficult.
 - a. **Kokhanok Wind Project** – Mr. Cotten reported that the two turbines which were placed in the fall of 2010 are a good example of a successful high penetration wind system that works in rural Alaska.
 - b. **Wind Monitoring in Igiugig**– One met tower is in place in Igiugig to gather information about the viability of wind power there. The data will be available in the fall to determine if wind is a good option.
 - c. **Wood Boiler Contracts**– Wood boilers will be installed in the fall to displace diesel in Kokhanok and Igiugig.
 - d. **Port Heiden Power System and Wind Design** – No discussion
 - e. **Lake Iliamna Community Barge Landing & Dock Project**– The Borough will be installing barge landings in Kokhanok and Igiugig and will repair the dock in Iliamna.
 - f. **Perryville Boat Launch & Haul Out Facility** – Perryville is planning a boat launch and haul out facility.
 - g. **Chignik Boat Harbor Construction** – no discussion
 - h. **Williamsport/Pile Bay Road & Associated Projects**– no discussion
 - i. **Iliamna/Nondalton Road** – no discussion
 - j. **City of Chignik and Chignik Lagoon Hydro Studies** –
 1. **Indian Creek Hydro Feasibility Study** – no discussion

K. TIME AND PLACE OF NEXT MEETING

1. **Regular Meeting – Tuesday June 12, 2012 at 8:00 am via teleconference** – The Assembly will meet via teleconference for a short meeting on June 12, 2012 on the telephone.

L. CITIZEN'S COMMENTS –

Ida Apokedak - Mrs. Apokedak asked what Lake and Peninsula Borough's views are on Pebble mine. The Mayor said that the Borough passed a resolution that said we will gather information and when a plan is offered, we will consider it. The Borough also passed an ordinance requiring any big project to get a permit. The ordinance addresses a large project's impact on subsistence and the community lifestyle. Mr. Cotten said that the Borough was the only entity who protested Pebble's request for water rights. The Borough is currently reviewing the scientific data that Pebble released. The Borough wants to focus on the truth and on the science, not on the theater and on the advertisements. Assembly member Alvarez said that the Borough met with the EPA last spring. The Mayor said that if the project is built, the Borough needs to be prepared and if the project does not happen the Borough needs to be prepared. Regardless of what the mining company or the other governmental agencies do, the Borough must plan for all possible scenarios and how it could affect the people of Lake and Peninsula Borough. **Howard Nelson** noted that there is an EPA meeting scheduled for May 20th in Iliamna. Assembly member Sue Anelon said that during the recent Assembly trip to Red Dog, they met with the village of Noatak and was surprised. Noatak is a subsistence village 30 miles from Red Dog mine. Prior to the mine opening the villagers lived off welfare and when they were asked how the mine benefitted them; the villagers said they are still struggling to get a road.

Colter Barnes – Mr. Barnes asked how important the communities to the Borough are. He asked if anything is being done to address their immediate needs. The Mayor said the Borough is here to support the villages. The Borough passes through as much money as possible and does not retain a fee for the service. He said that the Assembly wants to give the communities maximum self-determination. The Borough is here to help, but not to dictate or artificially inflate any community. What the community does with the money from the Borough is up to the leadership of the village or city, not to the Borough. The Borough will help to advance projects a community wants, but the local desire has to drive the project. Mr Cotten said that sometimes communities are not easily fixed.

Alexander Tallekpalek – Mr. Tallekpalek said that even though the schools are closing in the Borough, the communities are bringing in money. Some people have moved out, but Mr. Tallekpalek said he moved back in because he learned a lot while outside. He noted that SAVEC is a local vocational school and that kids can attend there and not have to go far from home. Education is available, Mr. Tallekpalek said, people just need to want it.

Howard Nelson – Mr. Nelson said that Levelock created a watershed plan. It is on file with the State. He asked if Lake and Peninsula Borough will help police a watershed plan. The Mayor said that the plan should be looked at and considered if it is still viable. He asked Mr. Nelson to make a written request to have the watershed plan included in the comprehensive plan. Mr. Nelson added that the watershed plan was created when it was realized that there were 44,000 user hours by tourists on the river near Levelock. It is available on the internet, as well, he said.

M. ASSEMBLY COMMENTS

Sue Anelon – Assembly member Anelon said she appreciated having the high school kids in attendance because they will be the leaders to lead this Borough. They need to learn the issues and how to lead. There was a discussion of a Junior Assembly. Assembly member Anelon then noted that the Borough approved a liquor license at the last meeting for No See Um Lodge. Mr. Nelson said that the village council should have a meeting to consider it as well. Assembly member Anelon then asked about improvements in Levelock. She asked if

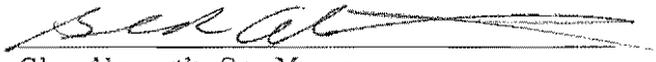
there was a gravel source. Mr. Nelson said there is a gravel pit 17 miles upriver and the villages used it only once and had to barge the gravel back to the village.

Michelle Ravenmoon – Assembly member Ravenmoon said she learns a lot at every meeting. She said she appreciates the questions – even the difficult ones. The Assembly is trying to get to all the communities and increase the communications. She said the Assembly is talking about issues and is concerned. We want the schools and communities to succeed, she said.

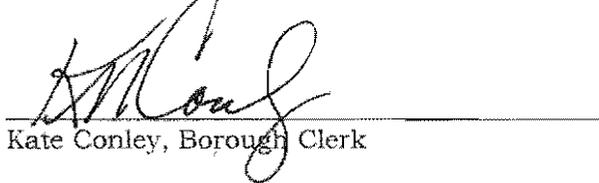
